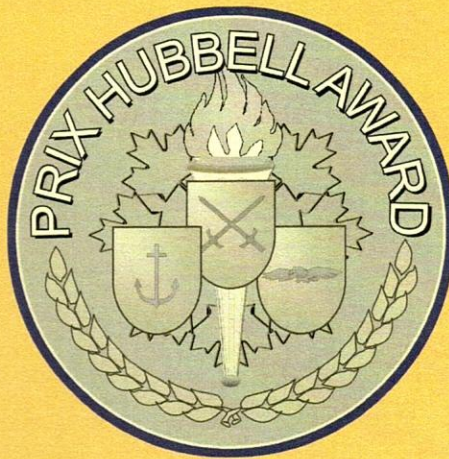

Keynote Address

Brigadier-General D. N. Brais, CD
*Commander, Cadets and
Junior Canadian Rangers Group*

Brigadier-General (BGen) Dominique Brais enrolled in the Canadian Armed Forces in 1991 through the Regular Officer Training Plan at the Collège militaire royal de St-Jean. Following completion of the Bachelor of Administration in 1995, she was commissioned as an Air Combat Systems Officer and completed training at the Canadian Forces Air Navigation School in Winnipeg, Manitoba.

Upon receiving her Navigator's Wings in 1996, she was posted to 14 Wing's 405 Long Range Patrol Squadron in Greenwood, Nova Scotia, where she served in CP-140 Aurora flying positions as an Acoustic Sensor Operator and Squadron Deputy Flight Commander. In 2001, she was posted to 404 Long Range Patrol and Training Squadron as an Instructor, Simulator Operator, and Squadron Deputy Operations Officer.

Following a transfer from the Regular Force to the Supplementary Reserve in 2004, BGen Brais moved to Ottawa and returned to full-time service, this time as a reservist in 2008. She served within the Military Personnel Command's (MILPERSCOM) Director Reserve Support Management in a variety of roles supporting the administration and career management of the members of the National Defence Headquarters and MILPERSCOM Primary Reserve.

In 2014, she was selected to attend the Joint Command and Staff Programme following which she was promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel and selected for employment within the Directorate Force Management of the Canadian Special Operations Command (CANSOFCOM). She held three simultaneous roles, appointed as the Commanding Officer of the CANSOFCOM Primary Reserves, and responsible for both the CANSOFCOM Selection program, occupation management, and during which she led the creation of a SOF occupation.

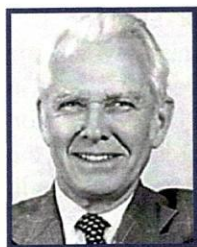
Promoted to Colonel in 2019, BGen Brais was appointed to the position of CANSOFCOM's Director Force Management, where she assumed the wide portfolio and responsibilities for the Command's military and civilian personnel management.

BGen Brais was promoted to her current rank in 2023 upon completion of the National Security Programme at the Canadian Forces College in Toronto.

BGen Brais is from Chapeau and Sudbury Ontario. She currently resides in Ottawa with her spouse where they enjoy spending time with their blended family of five adult children and two granddaughters.

Appointed to the position of Commander of the Cadets and Junior Canadian Rangers Group, BGen Brais is honoured to be entrusted with the leadership of one of Canada's foremost youth programs.

The Surgeon Captain Gordon P. Fahrni, DSC, MD Award (A Sea Cadet Award)



Dr. Gordon Paton Fahrni was born in Winnipeg in 1916. He graduated from the School of Medicine at the University of Manitoba in 1940 and then joined the Royal Canadian Navy.

He was deployed to England and assigned to His Majesty's Ship Fitzroy, a minesweeper until she was sunk in 1942. He was wounded during that action. For his actions, Dr. Fahrni was awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for bravery, devotion to duty, leadership, and skill in actions against the enemy submarines.

Following the war, he proceeded to post graduate work at the Toronto General Hospital and for further training at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, USA. He received his Fellowship (F.R.C.P.) and practiced as a general surgeon at the Winnipeg General, Children's and Grace Hospitals. He died peacefully in his sleep on January 20, 2007.

Cadet CPO2 Ielyzaveta Berezovska will be attending the University of Waterloo this Fall to become an actuarial analyst. She wishes to use statistics and logic to examine the probability of future events and manage financial strategy. Through Waterloo's co-op program, she is able to alternate academic semesters with full time work terms and earn career experience while she is still enrolled in university.

She served as the Training Petty Officer of her corps responsible for making schedules and managing sports nights. This was challenging due other extracurricular activities. She received the Legion Cadet Medal of Excellence for her efforts. Her experiences at summer training camps greatly shaped her leadership. She attended HMCS Quadra for the basic seamanship course, and later was an IT staff cadet. She attended Vernon for introduction to marksmanship. These and a recent seamanship deployment broadened her perspective and enhanced her ability to communicate and mentor others. She is currently serving as a CPO2 and the Regulating Petty Officer of her Corps.

Her community involvement has developed her leadership skills. In Junior Achievement she designed and illustrated a Winnipeg themed colouring book, helping her "company" win Manitoba's Company of the Year. She was a member of her school's student council and participated in the Canadian Ethics Bowl. The Lieutenant Laurence Gillmor Sherman Award

(An Army Cadet Award)



Lieutenant Laurence Gillmor Sherman was twenty when he was commissioned in the Calgary Highlanders. He went overseas in 1943 and was assigned to the Loyal Edmonton Regiment in Italy. He arrived in time for the assault on Monte Casino on May 23. It was in that battle that he fell at the age of 23.

In his book "The Liri Valley, Canada's World War II Breakthrough to Rome", military historian Mark Zuehlke writes in detail of that day's assault on the Hitler Line at Casino, and records that "...with both Lieutenants wounded, the sections were pinned down. One machine-gun was firing on the Edmonton's from just a few feet away. When Lieutenant Sherman attempted to organize the bridgehead inside the wire, he was struck three times by sniper fire and killed".

In 1995, Sherman Lake in northern Manitoba was named for him.

Being healthy helps her stay focused, manage stress, and have the energy to handle her responsibilities. She has learned that even basic fitness and discipline can improve confidence, resilience, and leadership ability. She participates in track and field and takes part in physical training, which helps her stay active. Overall, her approach to fitness is not about being extremely active, but about being consistent and mindful.

Cadet WO1 Bryce Wallach's goal in life is to join the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and serve in the north, particularly the Yukon, where he believes he can be a positive role model for the community youth. He has been accepted into the Marine and Powersport Technician program at Red River Polytechnic. This will allow him to service his own equipment and also benefit his community greatly, as he will be able to repair essential vehicles. This education will allow him to serve as an outstanding member of society and of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The cadet program has been one of the most defining parts of his life and has shaped him into the person he is today. He has attended the Fitness & Sports Instructor Course at Vernon, BC, Survival Instructor Course at Cold Lake, AB and served as the Survival Instructor Course Squadron Warrant Officer at Whitehorse, YT. While in Whitehorse he had to order the evacuation of his cadets from an area where a mountain lion had been sighted and was recognized for his outstanding leadership. One of his defining moments was when he assisted a Cadet Sergeant deal with depression, resulting in a successful outcome.

He has volunteered at a local winter park working as a member of the junior Ski Patrol and at the local Legion in Beausejour. He frequently volunteers for events and, as one of the most experienced volunteers, usually manages the other volunteers. He has organized six garbage clean ups in his local neighborhood. He also teaches others how to draw and create their own artwork.

He realizes the importance of physical fitness as it allowed him to run a number of kilometers to warn his cadets of the mountain lion. His experiences at the Fitness and Sports Instructor Course at Vernon, BC helped him develop strong fitness habits and he follows a strict routine that includes weightlifting four to five times a week and maintaining a healthy diet.

The Flight Sergeant Fred Marean Award (An Air Cadet Award)



Flight Sergeant Fred Marean was the eldest son of homesteaders from Iowa who settled in Saskatchewan. He was drafted under the National Resources Mobilization Act in 1941 and assigned to the Royal Canadian Artillery in Shilo for training. Three months later, he transferred to the RCAF for pilot training. He completed training in Virden, MB and

Yorkton, SK before proceeding to England where he flew Halifax bombers with the RAF.

He was the pilot of one of about 1,000 aircraft, whose mission was to bomb a factory manufacturing military equipment. His return trip took him over Holland, where his aircraft was intercepted by a night fighter. He was the only Canadian aboard and was twenty-three. The others were in the RAF. They are all buried in a small cemetery near Uden, Holland.

The residents of Uden pay tribute annually to the many air crew buried nearby. Marean Lake in Saskatchewan is named for him.

Cadet WO2 Jan Ziv Prieto's goal of pursuing medicine was inspired by her mother's experiences and stories of working in healthcare which always ended with "I saved someone's life today". Internships at labs and exposure to modern medicine confirmed her decision to study at the University of Manitoba to become a physician and one day, she will have the privilege to say, "I saved a life today."

The Air Cadet Program provided her opportunities to shape her leadership skills. She has been a member of the Flag party and Drill Team and completed the Cadet Correspondent Course. As a Level 5 senior cadet she prepares lessons for, and teaches, junior cadets. She represented Cadets at the World Police and Fire Games and at Remembrance Day ceremonies at Dugald, MB and at her school. She was Top Level 2 Cadet, Top Boots Cadet and received the Cadet Long Service Medal. She has also received Marksman Classification, Bronze Biathlon, and Bronze Fitness Proficiency awards.

She was co-leader of the Prairie Restoration Garden. She entered the Caring for Our Watersheds competition, earning \$1,000 in project funding and guided a team of over 50 students to create the garden. At school she co-leads Teen Connect, is a member of the School Leadership Committee, Vice President of the STEM Fellowship, she has volunteered at a Group Home and is co-captain for the Maples Collegiate Dance Crew.

Physical fitness and well-being help strengthen her body and mind to become a more capable and resilient leader. She is part of 3 advanced dance teams competing at the national level, winning many awards. She trains in dance five times a week to maintain her fitness, which in turn helps her stay focused, disciplined and energized in her personal and leadership roles.

The Lieutenant Colonel (Retd) James R. Popplow, CD, BSC, BED, MD, MSC, ABPM (AM), FACPM Award (An Air Cadet Award)



LCol (Ret'd) James Popplow joined the RCAF in 1961 at age 18 and trained as a Radio Officer at RCAF Station Winnipeg. He was posted to 415 Maritime Patrol Squadron flying in the CP-107 Argus out of RCAF Stn Summerside, PEI. In 1966 he returned to Queen's University for his BSc, BEd and MD degrees and rejoined the CF. In 1980, as a CF

Flight Surgeon, he completed an MSc in aerospace medicine at Wright State University, Dayton Ohio.

He retired as Air Command Flight Surgeon in 1995. He then joined Manitoba Public Health as a medical advisor in environmental health for eleven years. In 2007, in response to a CF Medical Service need during the Afghanistan War, he returned to 1 Canadian Air Division as a senior Flight Surgeon until his 2013 retirement.

Dr Popplow was the HCol of 16(Regina) and 17(Winnipeg) Field Ambulance from 2006 to 2012.

Cadet WO1 Himani Bhatt is a first-year student in the Faculty of Science at the University of Manitoba. Brought up in a family where education is heavily prioritized, she believes in Nelson Mandela's words, "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." Her experiences at the U of M have motivated her to pursue post-graduate studies to become a pediatric cardiologist.

She strives to lead by example and has actively sought new challenges. Attending summer courses such as effective speaking, basic survival, or introduction to military band, gave her foundational skills as an individual and leader. Challenged with public speaking she joined her squadron's Toastmasters program winning a provincial effective speaking competition and competed at a national competition. She was awarded a second bar on her service medal and received the Cadet Medal of Excellence for her dedication. She became her Squadron's Warrant Officer First Class in March 2026.

She is deeply rooted in community service. She was the Student Council President and volunteered with a cancer fundraiser, Relay for Life. She volunteers with the Gujarati School of Language and Culture, and with the Health Sciences Centre, Manitoba Marathon, Black and Gold Committee, and as a swim instructor. She prioritizes staying active with running cross country, water-polo, badminton, tennis and swimming. She incorporates activities targeting her physical fitness and mental health.

The Honorary Colonel Ben Van Ruiten, MSM, CD Award (An Air Cadet Award)



Honorary Colonel Ben Van Ruiten was born in the Netherlands, surviving the Second World War terror. He served as interpreter 1945-1946 with the British Army. At age 29 he immigrated to Canada, working in Victoria, B.C. for two years. Joined Winnipeg Florists Company Ltd. in 1951, becoming C.E.O. in the mid-eighties. A gentleman of impeccable integrity, boundless energy, wonderful sense of humour and forever proud of his Canadian Citizenship. He was the Honorary Consul of the Netherlands for 17 years. The appointment of Honorary Colonel of 17 Wing, was his labour of love that kept him young and on his toes. Forever grateful to the Veterans of the Canadian Armed Forces for restoring freedom to the Netherlands in 1945. Honorary Colonel Van Ruiten was an outstanding example of professionalism, civic responsibility and leadership, bringing great credit to himself, to 17 Wing and to the Canadian Forces serving here and abroad.

Cadet WO2 Igor Telyatnikov will attend the Price Faculty of Engineering at the University of Manitoba, pursuing a Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering with its co-op program provides hands-on experience. After graduating, he hopes to work in Manitoba, whether that means contributing to the province's power infrastructure or working in the government on systems that affect every day Canadians.

He is on his squadron's Marksmanship Team, participated in Zone competitions, and is now the head coach and co-captain. During his Level 4 ACR he commanded the Drill Team, earning him the Outstanding Drill Award. He has completed the Virtual Survival Course, the CAP program, and attended Whitehorse CTC as a Staff Cadet. He has volunteered at the Cadet Flying Sites in Brandon and Gimli.
